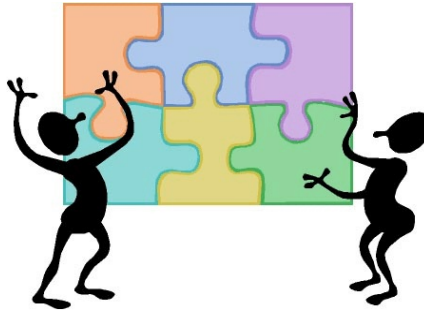

**Course Title:** Industrial Supervision

**Course Number:** Industrial Technology 492

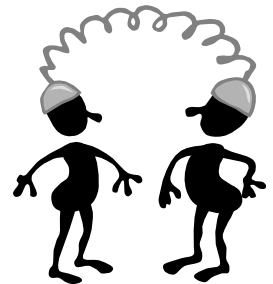
**Grading:** Pass/Fail

**Course Description:** An honors course devoted to the solution of actual manufacturing/design problems from business and industry (with solutions based on previous course work and research) using individual and team approaches.

## Course Requirements:

- Meet weekly with the faculty advisor and other team members
- Use variety of sources to research assigned topics
- Dedicate the time necessary to complete assigned work by the due date.
- Complete all work in a professional manner.
- Submit all assignments on time.
- All assignments must be typed (No handwritten assignments accepted).
- Participate in problem solving discussions (in person & on-line).
- Develop design solutions through sketches & refine them into working drawings
- Check your email and Blackboard for information and project updates
- Maintain daily log of activities (*form on Blackboard*)
- Write Final report detailing projects undertaken, the results and what you have learned
